Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

These are essential items when it comes to protection from smoke, fire and carbon monoxide poisoning.

- Install devices on every floor and outside bedrooms.
- Conduct intermittent device testing.
- Replace batteries once per year.
- Replace smoke detectors every ten years, and carbon monoxide detectors every seven to ten years.*

Fireplaces and Chimneys

Checking the following will ensure proper ventilation and help you identify any necessary repairs.

- Have your chimney swept once per year.
- Perform regular (wood and gas) fireplace cleanings.
- Have a professional conduct a yearly inspection of your fireplace, chimney and furnace.



Windows and Door Locks

Check these frequently to safeguard from burglaries and accidents.

- Replace any broken and/or loose locks.
- Ensure doorknobs are secure and in working order.
- Safety bar windows should have a quick-release for emergencies.
- Consider outer storm doors for secondary protection.
- Look into glass break detectors and motion sensors.
- Research smart door locks.*

Emergency Planning

- Install an accessible, working fire extinguisher.
- Map out a home emergency escape plan.
- Post a visible emergency contact list.
